






Positive Impact

- For the first time *Positive Impacts* are proactively mentioned throughout the Guidelines
- Positive Impacts have been described, explained and implemented whenever relevant and/or applicable
- We can distinguish three types of positive impacts:
 - Type A Positive social performance going beyond business as usual
 - Type B Positive social impact through presence
 - Type C Positive social impact through product utility


The different types of impact assessment

- Extensive changes have been made to better describe and distinguish the different types of social impact assessment
 - Type I Reference Scale Approach → assessing the social performance or risk
 - Type II Impact Pathway Approach → prediction of past, current and future social consequences through causeeffect-relations

Methodological Sheets to complete the guidelines were published in 2013. They described the impact subcategories and provided example of indicators to use.

They are being integrated to the revised version of the Guidelines



- 1. Working group on Stakeholder Society and related subcategories
 - Main questions
 - What would be the final definition for Society?
 - What would be the final list of subcategories for Society?
 - How to practically redefine Public commitment towards contribution and Technology development?
 - Conclusions on these question made by working group, to be entered in V3

2. Working group on subcategories I

Ethical treatment of animals, Wealth distribution

- Main questions
 - How to precisely define new subcategories on Ethical treatment of animals, Wealth distribution?

→ First drafts for definitions in Methodological Sheets format are being prepared until beginning/midst of September

3. Working group on subcategories II

Employment relationship (Small-scale businesses, Informal sector workers), Sexual harassment and Mental health

- How to define a subcategory on Employment relations (Smallholders/Small-scale businesses & Informal sector workers)?
- What could be subcategories/indicators for Sexual harassment and Mental health?
- → First drafts have been prepared and are currently revised

4. Working group on Aggregation and weighting

Main questions

- → Stress the transparency point in terms of weighting and generally for the assessment
- → display approaches for aggregation (e.g. geometric aggregation)
- → link weighting also to interpretation section
- → differentiate the different assessment levels where weighting may apply
- → create template to ensure transparency to be used in assessment (e.g. as used in GRI)
- → Revision has been done by working group to be reviewed by SC

5. Task Force on Impact Assessment and related terms

- → Start from comments made on v2 draft
- provide consistent definition of terms for risk, impact and potential impact based on common and relevant definitions
- → define areas of protections and if possible impact categories of relevance
- → regard Type I as well as Type II!
- → Revision is ongoing

6. Task Force on Stakeholder category Children

Main questions

- → Provide a definition for the stakeholder category
- → Define a list of subcategories → define the AIM and approach of the each (orientate on methodological sheets)
- → Ensure minimization of overlaps with existing subcategories covered under other stakeholder categories
- → Work is ongoing

7. Working group on Communication

- → Starting from White Paper on Communicating Products' Social Impacts
- → Provide guidance on how to communicate
- → Work is starting

8. Working group on Poverty alleviation/reduction

Main questions


- → Check if the topic is sufficiently represented in existing subcategories (orientate on Worldbank)
 - → Revision of it representation in the current Guidelines conducted
- → Consider absolute vs. relative poverty
- → Link to Fair Salary, Discrimination, Contribution for Economic Development, Child Labor and Wealth distribution

9. Working group on Site specific data collection


Main questions

- → Provide guidance on how to collect data on site
- → Work is ongoing










Goals of the road testing 1/2

- Build capacity on the new Social LCA Guidelines in diverse sectors and regions.
- Identify the need for additional specifications or clarifications.
- Test the methodology requirements and the clarity of the descriptions/ explanations/ requirements.
- Obtain direct feedback from practitioners.
- Provide clear illustrations of the usefulness of the methodology in different user case scenarios.
- Increase company's awareness about social topics and their data availability in connection with other tools such CSR and Sustainability reports







Goals of the road testing 2/2

- * Compile practical experiences applying Social LCA that could be replicated by other sectors and in other regions.
- Identify main difficulties and drawbacks/ success and highlights related to the application of the methodology.
- ❖ Share insights from the implementation of S-LCA and /or SO-LCA with available assessment methods and information.



Pilots selection process and timeline

Call and selection of road-testers (04/24/19 to 09/30/2019)

Agree specific conditions with each road-tester (10/31/2019).

Kick-off-Web meeting and webinar with an introduction to the methodology and explanation on how to use the template (November 2019)

Web trainings (January 2020 and February 2020)

Implement the methodology (10-12 months)

Regular meetings (every 1-2 months). Individual or collective (common questions / confidentiality conflicts). Online or face-to-face (international conferences)

Obtain results according to the template and confidential reports from road-testers (02/28/2021)

Call for expression of interest details

We would like to have as many as possible pilots which covers:
